Kia ora Msgr. David,

s I write this letter the current conflict in the Holy Land continues to intensify and the human crisis escalates. Meanwhile, in our relatively peaceful and untouched corner of the world, as Christmas draws nearer I get the sense that, over the years, Christmas has become more a time of receiving rather than giving.

Like many, I believe that giving back and remembering those less fortunate at Christmas is important. We can make a powerful difference in the lives of those most in need when we give at Christmas.

Peace is something that our world desperately needs. In the midst of uncertainty and turmoil overseas we find ourselves watching on from afar, feeling helpless, but compelled to assist in some way.

Giving is at the heart of the Christmas message. In the work that we do supporting vulnerable communities, I see the immense power of this every day.

With your support, we have stood with vulnerable communities, advocated for, and worked to build peace where it is so crucially needed.



The Holy Land: The Road to Peace

I'm sure like me, you have been following the recent conflicts in the Holy Land closely.

The scale of this crisis can be difficult to comprehend from such a distance. What is obvious, however, is the tragic human cost of what has unfolded.

Thousands of lives have been lost, and many thousands more have sustained serious injuries.

Over a million people in Gaza have been displaced, and they urgently require food, shelter, healthcare, and psychological support. Gaza's entire population is experiencing severe shortages of electricity, water, fuel, food, and medicine.



100,000 people need humanitarian assistance.



Over 1 million people forced to flee their homes.



Over 60 percent of the fatalities are women and children.

The recent bombardments and shelling exacerbated an already deadly humanitarian crisis. Even before the latest events, 80% of Gaza's population were reliant on some sort of humanitarian support.

These latest events have seen further destruction of homes, crucial water and sanitation infrastructure, and a hospital in Gaza. There are growing concerns about a looming water crisis. Hospitals have been overwhelmed with injured patients and continue to face severe shortages of fuel and other essential supplies.

The human cost to this conflict has been tragic, with thousands of casualties in Israel and Gaza, including thousands of children. We know the recovery will be long and will likely continue for years to come. We will be with the people of the Holy Land on their road to recovery.

If we have learned one thing from history, it is that education is the key to changing hearts and minds. The work of our long-standing partner Bethlehem University is crucial to teaching and promoting peace to the next generation. The University, which teaches students of all faiths and backgrounds, has been greatly affected by the recent violence, with one of their students being tragically killed in mid-October. Despite recent challenges, the University remains committed to promoting excellence and teaching peace to the next generation.

Finally, I wanted to share a special story I was told recently by our partners Caritas Poland. The story is about a mother who fled the violence in Ukraine, fearing for the safety of her young son. It highlights the immense impact of our international network.

Tanya sits on a makeshift bed in Przemyśl, Poland, anxiously checking her phone for messages from the family she left behind. Tanya and her son Nikita are the only members of their family who have made it across the border into Poland after fleeing their war-torn homeland.

Leaving her husband and second son behind in Ukraine, the war has torn Tanya's family apart.

The family initially took shelter near their home in Mykolaiv but, fearing for her sons' safety, Tanya fled for Poland. Eventually, they reached Przemyśl, Poland, and took refuge in a



temporary accommodation facility run by Caritas. They had few belongings when they arrived; but Caritas supported them, providing Tanya and her son with the vital support and supplies they needed.

Tanya sits on the bed watching the harrowing coverage of the war in her homeland; hoping that her city remains unscathed and that her friends and family are unharmed.
